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A MESSAGE FROM OUR RECTOR

Dearly Beloved

May God our Father and the Lord Jesus Christ give you grace and peace.(1 Cor. 1:3)

It's now two months since I have returned after a blessed sabbatical of 3 months, which was partly spent at home and abroad.

Abundant thanks for allowing me this time of rest and reflection.

It started off with the marriage of our only Daughter, Vivienne Apples to Tyron Lloyd on the 4 May 2019. A day that flew past me and the mixed emotions of letting someone go that are so close to your heart. And finally, after a number of days, an empty room, then the acceptance, that she has started a new life with someone else, who is now our new son. I only then understood what it meant to let someone go. Many will perhaps try to reassure me that she will remain in your heart and thoughts, but there is a new distance of knowing they are there, but not in your house.

Eventually jetting off to the United Kingdom, to spend 3 weeks with the Monks of the Community of the Resurrection in Mirfield.

We had plenty of time for silence, to pray,

to read, to eat, to sleep, to write and to relax. A very different life as to the one we all live.

I was struck by the simplicity of their worship. The chanting of Psalms, the reading of Holy Scripture with patience and clarity, the celebration of the Eucharist with "awe" and "wonder".

CR House with its surroundings was beautifully kept, a happy home for all kinds of birds, chirping and singing along. As I was sitting in the garden, watching a bird hopping along on the beautiful outstretched lawn, it flew off, only later to return to a "chalice like" fountain to drink from it. A reminder to us, that we need to all return to drink from the chalice "Blood of Christ" to remain connected to the true Vine, Jesus Christ. (John 15:5)

I started to attend An Individually Guided Retreat from the 2nd June 2019. Fr Nicolas was my guide for the week. I was required to reflect on a number of Scriptures that was given to me on a daily basis.

Reflecting on my ministry these past 7 years, the Holy Spirit made me realise the following:

Whatever good happened – It was God who still allowed miracles to happen on a daily basis. Sometimes we are blind to see it. Do we still see the miracles happening on a daily basis in our lives?

During the month of Easter, I had the privilege to hand the sick/housebound an Easter gift. This initiative was a way for the church to acknowledge the sick/housebound and to let them know the church has not forgotten about them. The parishioners were very excited and grateful as they received these gifts.

During the school holidays the Holiday Club was hosted at Christ the Good Shepherd. Once again, we were reminded of the serious social issues being experienced in our communities. Many children are faced with extremely difficult issues where poverty seems to be high on the list. This has also reminded us that the church must be the Beacon of Hope in our communities. We pray for the ministry of the Mother's Union as they have taken the responsibility of heading the soup kitchen on a weekly basis during the winter months. We also pray for the AWF who contributes to the soup kitchen when possible.

During the three months while Rev Dean has been on Sabbatical, I have realised that many parishioners are not aware of the different offices and the responsibilities of clergy. The parishioners also need to be refreshed with regards to the meaning of the sacraments and how it must be exercised. My prayer is that as a church we will be open to be refreshed with regards to teachings of the church.

A Distinctive Deacon, also known as a Permanent Deacon , is a Servant of the Servants Their responsibility is to visit the sick/housebound and serve the less fortunate/vulnerable. A transitional Deacon also has the responsibility to visit the sick/housebound and later to be Ordained as a Priest. A Full Stipendiary Priest has all the responsibilities of a parish and receives a stipend.

A Non-Stipendiary Priest, also known as a Self–Supporting Priest, is a priest who is employed on a full-time basis and offer his/her available time to the parish. The parish gives the SS priest a travelling allowance. I am a Non-Stipendiary Priest who is currently a Hospital Chaplain at Lentegeur Psychiatric Hospital. It was interesting to juggle my time between work and church, however, I strived to do my best as far as it was possible.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank each and every one at the parish for your love support while Rev Dean was on sabbatical.



THE CHURCHWARDENS STAVE



Each Week when you attend church services, you will see two brass staves fixed to the pews, about half way down the centre aisle. Have you ever wondered what are they and what are they used for? These are simply the Church Wardens Staves and are symbols of the office that they hold. Church Wardens are the principal representatives of the congregation and are officers of the Bishop, hence the top of the cross representing the Bishop's mitre.

These staves go back to the earliest days of the Anglican Church and it is reminder that Wardens are not just administrators and book-keepers. With the Rector, they share a responsibility of the spiritual welfare of the parish. For that reason, they are kept in the church and not in the parish office. On important occasions, the Wardens, on behalf of the congregation, bear these symbols when they welcome the Bishop they enter the church for worship.

On a lighter note: In years past they had another function, to jab

parishioners who had fallen asleep during a sermon!

What is the Anglican Communion?

We are sure that you have heard that we belong to the Anglican Communion and wondered: *"What is the Anglican Communion?"*.

The Anglican Communion is one of the world's largest Christian communities. It has tens of millions of members in more than 165 countries around the globe. Anglicanism is one of the traditions or expressions of Christian faith. Others include Roman Catholicism, Eastern Orthodox, Lutheran and Baptist.

The Communion is organised into a series of provinces and extraprovincial areas. The provinces are subdivided into dioceses, and the dioceses into parishes.

There are 40 provinces and, from March 2019, five extra-provincial areas. Some provinces are national, others are regional. All are in communion – or a reciprocal relationship – with the See of Canterbury and recognise the Archbishop of Canterbury as the Communion's spiritual head.

But there is no central authority in the Anglican Communion. All of the provinces are autonomous and free to make their own decisions in their own ways _ guided bv recommendations from the four Instruments: the Archbishop of Canterbury, the Lambeth Conference, the Primates' Meeting and the Anglican Consultative Council.



That the famous hymn "It Is Well With My Soul", written by hymnist Horatio Spafford and composed by Philip Bliss, was written after traumatic events in Spafford's life. The first was the death of his son at the age of two and the Great Chicago Fire of 1871, which ruined him financially (he had been a successful lawyer and had invested significantly in property in the area of Chicago that was extensively damaged by the great fire). His business interests were further hit by the economic downturn of 1873, at which time he had planned to travel to Europe with his family on the SS Ville du Havre. In a late change of plan, he sent the family ahead while he was delayed on business concerning zoning problems following the Great Chicago Fire. While crossing the Atlantic Ocean, the ship sank rapidly after a collision with a sea vessel, the Loch Earn, and all four of Spafford's daughters died. His wife Anna survived and sent him the now famous telegram, "Saved alone ...". Shortly afterwards, ลร Spafford traveled to meet his grieving wife, he was inspired to write these words as his ship passed near where his daughters had died.^[2] Bliss called his tune Ville du Havre, from the name of the stricken vessel.



((()))) CELL PHONE TOWERS AND HEALTH CONCERNS

With the installation of the cell phone tower on our church property, there have been some questions asked about the health concerns. The following is an extract from:

American Cancer Society -Latest on Cell Phone Towers

Some people have expressed concern that living, working, or going to school near a cell phone tower might increase the risk of cancer or other health problems. At this time, there is very little evidence to support this idea. In theory, there are some important points that would argue against cellular phone towers being able to cause cancer.

The American Cancer Society has updated its public information on cell phone towers and cancer.

Do cellular phone towers cause cancer?

Some people have expressed concern that living, working, or going to school near a cell phone tower might increase the risk of cancer or other health problems. At this time, there is very little evidence to support this idea. In theory, there are some important points that would argue against cellular phone towers being able to cause cancer.

•First, the energy level of radiofrequency (RF) waves is relatively low, especially when compared with the types of radiation that are known to increase cancer risk, such as gamma rays, xrays, and ultraviolet (UV) light. The energy of RF waves given off by cell phone towers is not enough to break chemical bonds in DNA molecules, which is how these stronger forms of radiation may lead to cancer.

•A second issue has to do with wavelength. RF waves have long wavelengths, which can only be concentrated to about an inch or two in size. This makes it unlikely that the energy from RF waves could be concentrated enough to affect individual cells in the body.

•Third, even if RF waves were somehow able to affect cells in the body at higher doses, the level of RF waves present at ground level is very low - well below the recommended limits. Levels of energy from RF waves near cell phone towers are not significantly different from the background levels of RF radiation in urban areas from other sources, such as radio television broadcast and stations.
